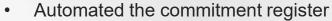

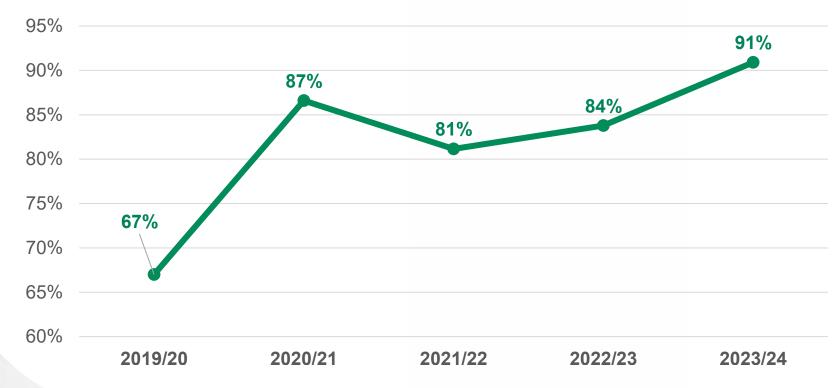




Trend analysis of APP progress

5 Year Target – A career guidance and career development strategy which is developed and implemented to guide the W&RSETA career guidance interventions over the period 2020/21 – 2024/25.

Career guidance strategy developed and approved in 2020/21 and is being implemented.

Highlights:

- 787 events held in urban and rural areas
- 36 life orientation educators capacitated to use career guides
- 25 people enrolled on Career Guidance Information Officer qualification
- Development of a Careers Toolkit and Online Careers platform commenced to be completed in 2024-2025.







Outcome 3: Growth focused programmes for the development and support of Training Providers and the Higher Education, TVET and CET sectors to enable their responsiveness to changing occupations and technological advances

Outcome 8: An appropriately skilled, agile and responsive workforce and skills pool able to meet the W&R sector current and emerging skills needs

10 000 workers registered in programmes addressing Hard to Fill Vacancies.

10% reduction of imbalance between skills supply and demand for priority skills.

2000 employed and unemployed persons obtain qualifications in programmes that address current and emerging skills needs for increased responsiveness to 4IR and related technological advances.

1500 young people supported with ICT skills to access digitization job and entrepreneurship opportunities.

3500 learners exiting W&RSETA programmes

12 000 unemployed persons who completed W&RSETA programmes are employed or start their own businesses

Operation Lowlights 2023/24

Employed bursaries awarded

1513 against target of 1895 due to number of bursars not continuing with their studies.

2. Unemployed learners completing learning programmes

3794 against target of 5000 due to delays with certification processes which include credit uploads, external moderation, submission of certification requests, and reporting on certification, due to online printing of certificates functionality not yet been enabled.

Employed learners registered on learning programme

9139 against target of 9800 due to low uptake on 18.1 NQF 4-5 learnerships.

Operation Highlights 2023/24

Priority 1:

Priority Skills Plan - Economic Transformation and Job Creation

The Priority Skills Plan is intended to ensure that skills gaps are not a hindrance to economic growth and job creation. To address this, the W&RSETA identifies key skills and occupations to support and allocates funding to assist the labour market in the short- and medium term.

- Provincial Skills Plan, skills are identified to address gaps in particular provinces and subsectors.
- 624 learners awarded bursaries to enrol for ICT related qualifications to create a pool of ICT skills for agile, competitive and responsive sector.







Priority 2:

SMME, Informal Trader and Co-operative Development

397 emerging entrepreneurs participated in entrepreneurship development programmes

3 453 informal traders participated in W&RSETA capacitation workshops

3 573 SMMEs funded for skills development initiatives

124 Co-operatives and Community Based Organisations participated in skills development programmes



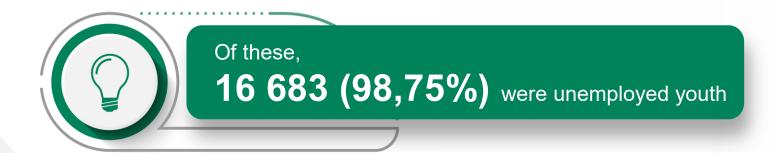




Priority 3:

Youth Unemployment

16 894 unemployed persons funded for learnerships, occupational qualifications, skills programmes and occupationally directed programmes at TVETs and HEIs









Priority 4:

22 283 SETA-funded learners enrolled on qualifications that respond to HTFVs

Hard-to-Fill Vacancies (HTFVs) and Skills Gaps









Priority 5:

Stakeholder engagement

9 CEO stakeholder engagements were convened, and 21 meetings held with senior executives.

34 provincial stakeholder forums in all 9 provinces.









Priority 6:

Training and Employment of People with Disabilities

1 162 people with disabilities accessed W&R occupationally directed programmes.









Priority 7:

Sector Transformation

298 employed learners enrolled on the Retail Management Development Programme **and 182** completed the programme

47 employed learners enrolled on the International Leadership Development Programme and 63 completed the programme

24 master's students awarded bursaries

636 employed learners enrolled on **NQF level 7and 8 programmes**, with **371** being women **(58.33%)**. Out of these women, 340 were from historically disadvantaged backgrounds.

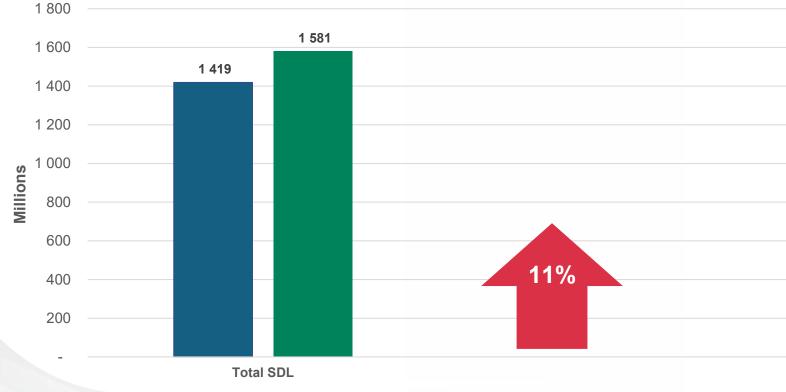




Financial Performance 2023/24

Total Levies received between 2022/23 and 2023/24 financial period







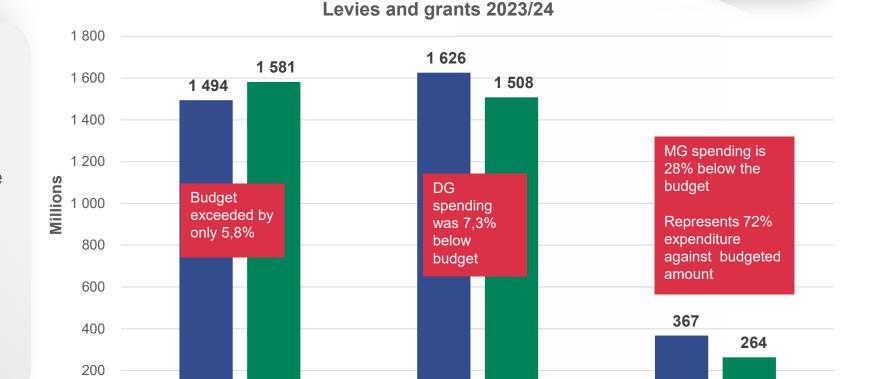
Skills Development for Economic Growth

- Skills Development Levy budget for 2023/24 FY was R1, 494 billion with a favourable actual income of R1, 581 billion.
- Discretionary Grant expenditure budgeted at R1 626 billion.
 Actual and total DG expenditure amounted to R1 508 million
- Mandatory Grant expenditure was budgeted at R367 million, actual and total expenditure amounted to R264 million

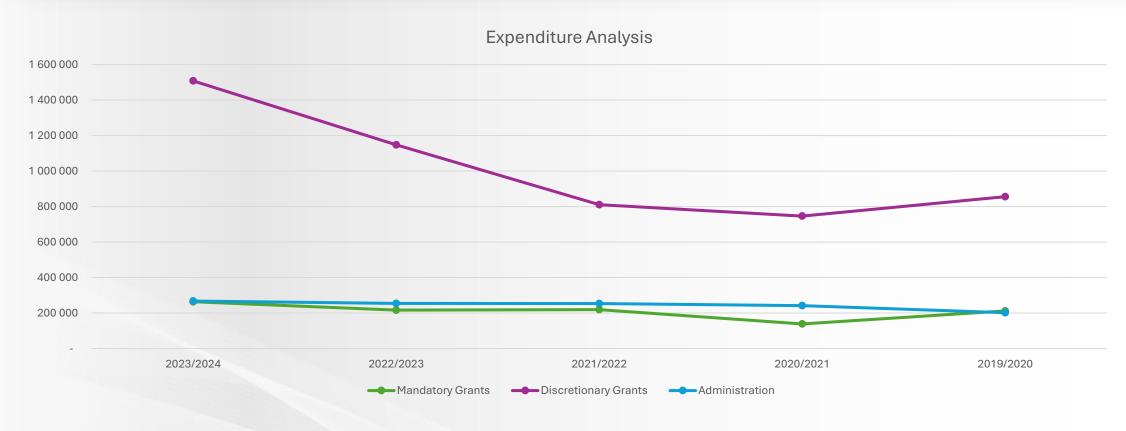

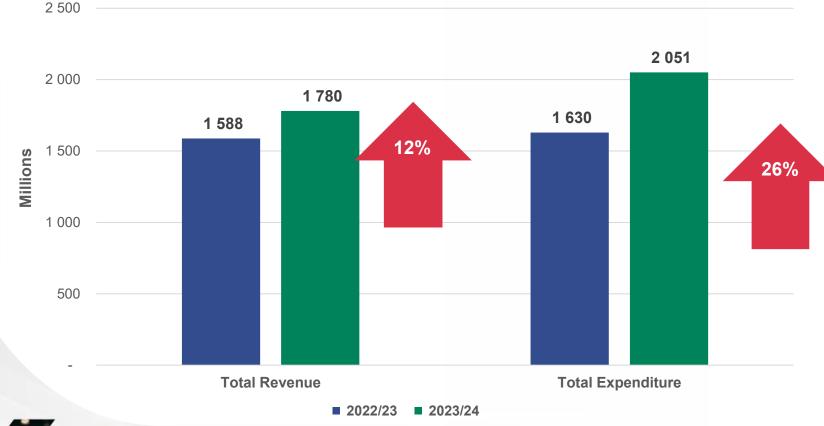






- Total revenue increased by R192 million (12%) in 2023/24 FY compared to 2022/23.
- Total expenditure increased by R421 million (26%) in 2023/24 FY compared to 2022/23.



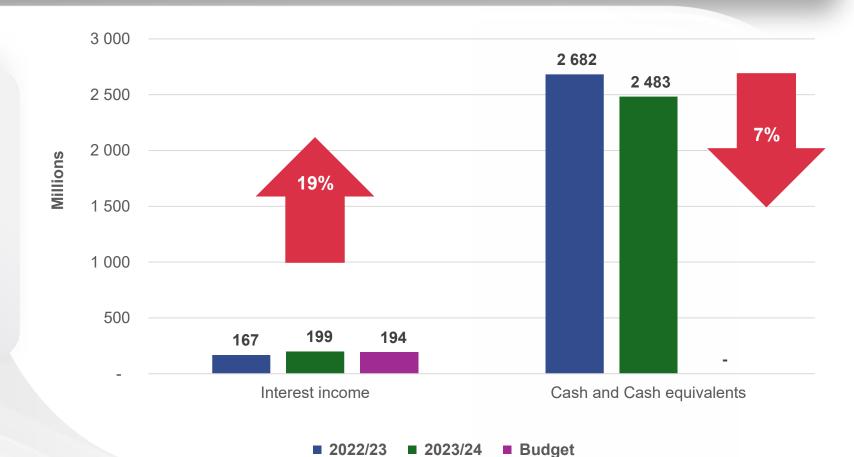








- Interest income increased by R32 million (19%), slightly higher than budget of R194 million
- Cash and cash equivalents decreased by 7% to R2,483 billion due to improvements on payment turn-around

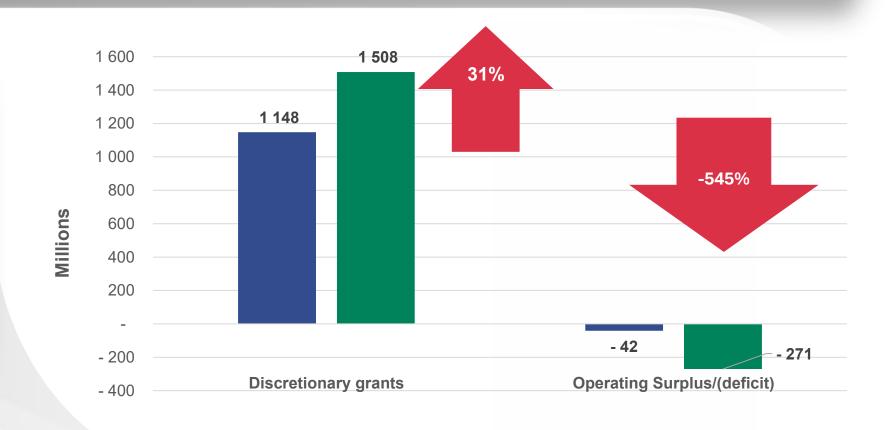








- Discretionary Grant expenditure increased by a favourable 31%
- Operating deficit for the year was R271 million due to significant decrease of 545% in surplus in the current financial year



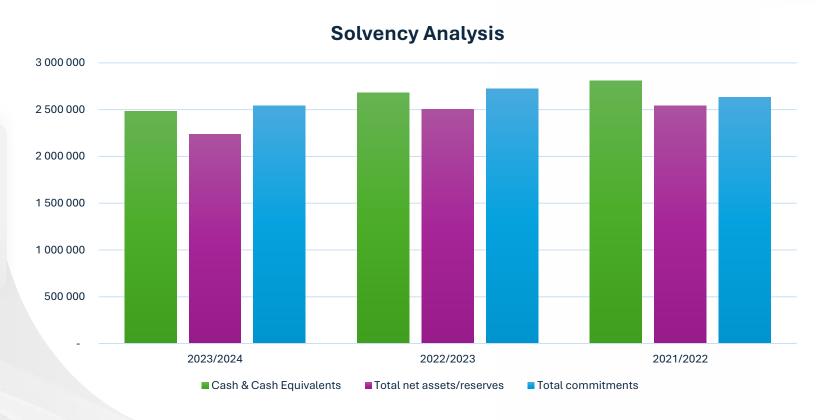




2022/23 2023/24



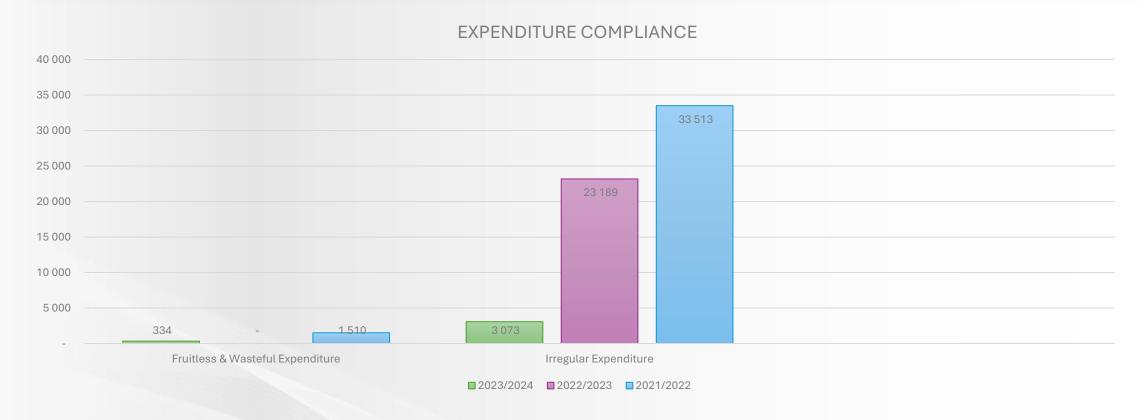
 Accumulated reserves reduced by 10,9% compared to prior year due to increase in DG expenditure reported.















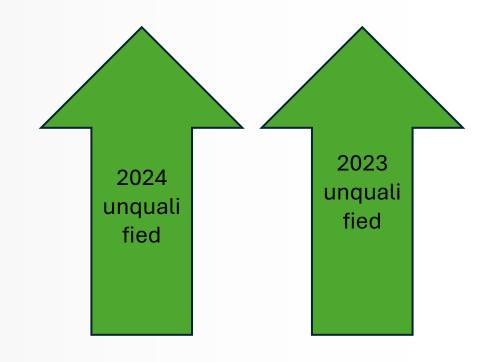
